Interview with our Youth/Teen Librarian



We interviewed Marlan Brinkley, our Youth and Teen Librarian as he was putting together the Summer Programs. He has been such a positive force since coming to the Library. We thought you'd like to get to know him.

- I. Marlan, how many years have you been a Librarian?
- 5 years and counting... A friend talked me into interning at a public library in the children's and teen department. I was completely hooked!
- 2. Why have you focused on this age group?

So much is happening in teen services, it's an exciting time to be in the field. Several years ago, almost no one was writing for teens and what was written wasn't worth their time or would only appeal to a certain cultural niche. These days there's what I'd call 'an embarrassment of riches' in youth literature. The youths themselves are fascinating in their reactions to the global world. and the technology they interact with.

3. What would you like to provide for this age group? You're competing with FaceBook, YouTube, texting, etc.

First of all, I'm not competing against any of these things. All of these technologies are simply excellent opportunities to communicate and interact with youths. These technologies make it much easier to inform youth about programs we're offering. Overall, I'd like to provide the youth a place in their community, dedicated to offering services to them, their needs, and interests.

4. What's the "BIG DEAL" for them today, in your opinion?

That's a tough one. The best way to answer your questions is to say, the 'big deal for teens... other teens. Most youths are influenced by their peer's interests. While celebrities are interesting and fun to watch and certainly affect language and style, not a single one has the same influence as a teen's friends. Trend-wise, I feel that teens are certainly taking the public nature of the technology more seriously and coming to understand the consequences. Oh, and I'm sorry to tell you the 90s are now considered 'retro'..ouch!
